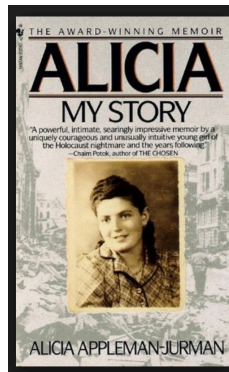

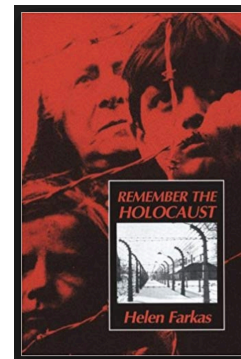
Meet Alicia San Jose



Alicia's life in Ukraine changed drastically when Hitler invaded. Her father was one of the men required to *register* who never returned. After surviving being tossed off a moving train, and the murder of her 4 brothers, ***she swore that if she survived she would spend her life telling her story.*** She witnessed the brutal murder of her mother, and at the age of 15 helped lead Jews through an *underground* route to Palestine. Throughout her life, she continued to tell her story in person, by phone interviews, and through her award winning book.

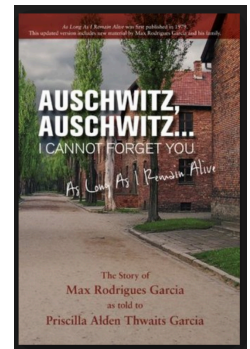
Meet Hillary Burlingame



Hillary promised: ***If I survive, I'll shout from the highest mountain what is happening here every day.*** When the Nazis marched into her Romanian village, her family of 10 was forced into the ghetto and deported to Auschwitz 5 weeks later. Only she and a sister survived. In the US, she set up a Holocaust educational center at Mercy High School in SF, and said ***every soul, every young person, should know about the Holocaust, because if we don't tell them, very soon it will be only in books.*** She continued to speak to students until she died.

Meet Max San Francisco



The Nazis invaded Max's Dutch childhood in 1940 and deported him to Auschwitz in 1943. He survived illness, death marches and 3 more camps before arriving at Ebensee from where he was liberated. Because he spoke English, Max found ways to serve the American forces which helped him get a visa to the US. His wife, Pat, helped transform his story to the book whose title is the lyrics to a prisoner song. Max taught his grandchildren ***forgive, but don't forget.***
